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Florida Allocations

- State: \$21,571,781.00
 - 4% to DOE and 1% to Program
- Districts/LEAs: \$20,493,191.95
 - 95 % to LEAs

School Districts Requirements

- Districts must provide equitable services for private schools.
- Districts Allocations of \$30,000 or more:
 - Conduct a comprehensive needs assessment that includes, at a minimum, a focus on three content areas:
 - Well-Rounded Educational Opportunities (at least 20% of funds)
 - Safe and Healthy Conditions (at least 20% of funds)
 - Effective Use of Technology
- Districts Allocations less than \$30,000:
 - Comprehensive needs assessment is not required
 - Only required to focus on one of the component areas: well-rounded, safe and healthy, and technology.
- A Special Rule to support the effective use of technology component:
 - No more than 15 percent of technology funds may be used to purchase technology infrastructure such as: *devices, equipment, software applications, platforms, digital instructional resources and/or other one-time IT purchases.*
